Palm Sunday Invitation

I don't know about you, but I read a lot during the national pandemic. One of my most enjoyable reads was *Being Reverend* by Revd Matt Woodcock. It describes Matt's time as a pioneer minister attached to Holy Trinity Church in Hull. If a book can make you laugh out loud and cry in the space of the same chapter, it has done its job.

This book was the sequel to *Becoming Reverend* which was written during Matt's time training for ministry. Matt writes succinctly, reflecting his former career as a journalist. His passion as an evangelist is also evident in every page - allied with a frustration with the Church for the ways in which we successfully turn people away or manage to put people off Church for life.

Being 'inside the job' I found there was much I could relate to. Matt is a great role model for clergy, a sort of male Kate Bottley - sharing with her 'off the scale' extroversion, a disarming honesty and a contagious sense of fun.

Matt will be giving a talk at Kettlewell Village Hall to mark the start of Holy Week at 7.30pm on Saturday 22 March. Matt will also be joining us as our guest preacher at our Palm Sunday service at Hubberholme Church.

Matt managed to secure live camels for a nativity procession through the streets of Hull. It makes my borrowing a fibreglass donkey from a local pub look very tame in comparison! I am delighted, however, to be able to confirm that that this year we will have live animals accompanying us on our Palm Sunday procession!

🔇 Hope at Kettlewell Primary School!



Continuing our series on hope, this month we meet Isabella, Betsy, Alfie and Connie -four amazing students in the Worship Committee at Kettlewell Primary School. Together with Claire Greenwood, Co-Headteacher at the Upper Wharfedale Primary Federation, they talked enthusiastically about 'Hope', which was the theme for their worship before the holidays.

What does hope mean for you?

Alfie: What we thought was there's different types of hopes and wishes. There's a world wish. That's for everybody.

Connie: And then there's a human wish for somebody that you care about.

Isabella: Our first world wish was stop war Besty: And our second was stop global warming.

Alfie: The third one was stop deforestation. Connie: And the fourth one was stop poverty. And we've got two human wishes and they're sort of a bit different. The first one was for a pet and that's more for vourself, but then the second one was to be healthy. That might be you or it might be a family member that's ill or going through something that is quite worrying.

Claire: We talked a lot about the fact that hopes could be something like material things, but quite often hopes were more than that. Hopes were about people's feelings and events and making a change, wasn't it? They don't necessarily have to be getting a new computer game - hopes are usually bigger than that, which we felt is the big difference between a hope and a wish.

What were some of the highlights of 2023 for you?

Connie: Well, my highlight this year was passing my Skipton girls test to get into high school. Yeah, it was quite funny actually. I thought I hadn't got in and I started crying. Then then my mom was telling me, you've got in, why you crying? But yeah, that was really exciting.

Alfie: My highlight last year was I started playing with a lot more friends.

Claire: We talked about friendship in school but also in other different walks of life like clubs, online and in real life too everywhere. It's all about friendship, isn't it?

Betsy: My highlight was getting my dog Angel. She's a Springer spaniel. She's a good puppy. She's actually better than one of the other dogs. [Betsy has seven dogs!] *Isabella:* My highlight of last year was the collective worship committee being the best of the Federation.

Claire: All the Federation schools went on a training day for their committees of leading assemblies. Kettlewell's committee were the best on the day and Isabella thought that was definitely a highlight!

What about this next year? What are your hopes for the year ahead?

Connie: Okay, so my exciting part this year will be going on my residential to London with school. So that will be fun. I've been with my family once or twice, but I don't remember much to be honest. I know about the main parts of London, but I've not been there that often.

Claire: They're going to the Tower of London, on a river cruise, on an open top bus, to see Matilda the musical, to see the changing of the guard - the list is endless! Connie had written down that her main thing was also about getting some sleep, but I pointed out if she doesn't, she's going to have a very grumpy me to deal with! She might do a roving report thing for the Link! Alfie: Mine is to get into Upper Wharfedale Secondary School. To start my application for it. And you get to sit on the bench!

Betsy: My hope is pretty much the same as Alfie's.

Claire: That's the excitement of being in year six. There are loads of privileges of being in year six, and you get to do lots of jobs and have extra responsibilities. Betsy will be in Year 6 too.

Tell us one or two responsibilities of being in year six. What do you get to do? *Alfie:* You get to sit on the bench. Everyone else has to sit on the carpet. You feel really cool - it's really fun.

Connie: You also get to chair school council. If you're on school council and

there should be two year sixes on school council, there'll be a secretary, and then there'll be a chair.

Isabella: My wish for next year is to do well in my times tables test.

Claire: There's now a statutory assessment at year four to times tables so it's nothing for Isabella to worry about at all because she's a superstar. They do an online times table check. It's not really a test, it's a check. She wants to do really well at that.

What are your hopes for the Upper Wharfedale Primary Federation?

Claire: Obviously, we're all for little schools that work closely together, and our hopes are that the Federation continues to grow and flourish. Kettlewell Primary School has 27 children, but there are 169 in the four schools that make up Federation. Our real strengths are our collaborations - not just the way that the children work together, which is lovely to see, but the way that we collaborate across schools. One of the things that we've built on since I came is we now use Kettlewell for all the Federation schools to come and do forest school on a Monday afternoon. We've also got the PTAs working together to organize shared events. This March we're doing a 'band and beer' night for all the Federation parents. We're trying encourage parents to collaborate, children to collaborate and all our staff to further links. We do lots of outdoor learning, and looking constantly for ways to make the four schools work well together and flourish - this is my main hope for the future for the Federation.

The children are also writing a report for the Link on a major project they are working on to regenerate the pond area next to the school with raised beds and gardens to grow vegetables and herbs!

There is something timeless and enchanting about the accompanying artwork in the books, especially the seasonal guides. The artist CF Tunnicliffe is a particular favourite of mine, creating images that you could simply step into. I have included some illustrations from the 1961 edition of 'What to look for in Spring' by E L Grant Watson (Ladybird Nature Book series 536) to accompany this month's diary.

The experience of looking through the books brings back memories of the treasure trove of the classroom 'nature table' in spring; a spray of golden catkins, half a speckled blackbird's egg, an intricate nest, blown out of a tree and discovered by enthusiasm, on the way to school. There is something incredibly comforting about revisiting the joy of discovering nature's bounty through the lens of childhood and it's delightful to see the appeal of these books enduring to this day.
