

From the Vicar...

The following reflection is from Father Simon Crook, Vicar of St John's Golcar and St Mark's Longwood near Huddersfield, who I recently met on retreat at Hag Dyke.

Not long ago I stayed at Hag Dyke, the highest chapel in the UK. It is at 1533 feet above sea level on the upper slopes of Great Whernside in the Yorkshire Dales.

One early morning, I met the local vicar there to celebrate Holy Communion while we watched the sunrise. From complete darkness, with candles providing our only light, the sky lightened, tantalisingly slowly, to reveal the beginnings of a beautiful new day. It was a majestic moment.



As if that was not enough, the only cloud in the sky looked rather like a dove, here is a photo of it. It felt like a special sign from God to both of us. It was as if he was blessing us, just as Jesus was blessed at his baptism: "And the Holy Ghost descended in a bodily shape like a dove upon him, and a voice came from heaven, which said, Thou art my beloved Son; in thee I am well pleased." (Luke 3.22).

God may have sent the cloud as a special sign to us, or it may have been a coincidence. Either way, God spoke deeply to both of us of his presence at that moment, his presence in our lives, and his blessing on our ministries.

Maybe you have received a sign from God? If so, don't spend too much time worrying about whether or not it is genuine. Simply accept it as a gift, a symbol of God's presence in the world and in your life, and an encouragement to you as you walk in his way.



This talk is pitched at businesses, community groups and individuals wanting to find out more about how the Yorkshire Dales National Park's Sustainable Development Fund can support projects that aim to promote a more sustainable way of living in, working in or visiting the National Park. Edward Sexton of Clapham based Glencroft will then reveal how the fund helped kick-start his company's now successful 'farm to yarn' project - Clapdale Wool - buying fleeces from farms within a 5-mile radius and transforming them into Yorkshire-made hand-knit yarn.

Tohn was born in Birmingham and came to Yorkshire to study mining engineering at Leeds University. Here he was introduced to caving and potholing and fell in love with the Dales. He didn't finish his degree course but got a job in an office working as a shipping clerk for Robert Hudson and Sons. Their main business with was Angola, Portuguese West Africa. By this time, we were married and had a son. David. When John was asked if he'd fancy a job in Angola, he leapt at the chance. This job as a marketing executive meant he had to learn Portuguese which he auickly managed. So in 1964 we set sail for Africa. We had 4 wonderful years in Luanda where our daughter Helena was born.

After Angola he got another marketing job, this time in Kinshasa R D Congo. This only lasted a year, not such a happy experience.

On our return to England in 1970, Leeds was the obvious choice of a place to settle. He got a job as a marketing executive with the YEB, first at Scarcroft and then to Hull area and finally to Bradford area until privatisation when he took voluntary redundancy.

By this time, he had achieved his dream of living in the Dales in Kilnsey acquiring Glenholme in 1980.

John then set up as a blacksmith, first at Malham forge and then at Kilnsey, following, as he liked to say, in the footsteps of his son David and his grandfather. Many of his works can be seen in churches in the Dales: Kirkby Malham, Conistone, Bolton Abbey, Coniston Cold and Denton.

Though his potholing days were over he kept in close touch with the friends he had



made. He made many local friends, often over a pint or two in the local pubs.

John enjoyed travel and visited family and old friends in South Africa, Australia, Namibia and Greece and also went to other places of interest, Cuba, Egypt and Gambia. Bird watching featured in all these visits as it did in the trips to Spain and Portugal in the ex-ambulance he converted to a camper van.

Over a long life, John's hobbies involved restoring old cars, listening to jazz, watching cricket and reading. Family and friends were the things most important to him especially when he became less mobile. He loved hearing of the achievements of his grandchildren and their partners and of his great grandson.

He died peacefully at home 0n 1st September and had a green burial at Tarn Moor.

S RABI

RABI is a national charity, supporting the farming community across England and Wales, and is one of the charities supported by Upper Wharfedale & Littondale Parish. Sally Connor, Regional Manager for RABI, visited the Parish in October and spoke at the services at Arncliffe and Hubberholme. Here's some of the information she shared with us.

Royal Agricultural Benevolent The Institution (RABI) provides a wide range of support and services, directly through our regionally based staff team and via partnerships with other specialist providers. This is customised to meet their individual needs and direct financial grant support to low-income individuals or those in financial crisis, a free helpline, in-person and online mental health counselling and 'click & chat' support tools/resources, mental health training, benefits guidance and support, training awards, relief farmworker awards, and emergency campaigns, such as the Return to School Campaign, which provided £1.5m in grants in 2022. More details of all these services are available on RARI website https://rabi.org.uk/about/. Here's a short message from one of their clients who had used the 'Click and Chat' support service.

"After messaging some of your colleagues at Click & Chat I was able to understand the biology of what's happening (after being prescribed new medicine by my health professional I woke one morning struggling to breath, heart pounding, and

arms and legs tingling, was terrified) and the advice has really helped. I will come back next week. I was reluctant at first, but I can't see any harm in trying. I don't know you, and you don't know me, yet I felt you did actually care about me, and you wanted my life to be better. Finally, and it doesn't relate to anything I've got going on at all, but it was really good to hear folk at Click & Chat are receiving training specific to agriculture, in my time in the young farmers club there were 3 different sets of kids each without a father, such a waste. Farming is different. At times it can be really hard. Very long hours, (common in the industry to do spells of 100hr+ weeks at lambing or harvest), physically demanding, financially stressful, working alone, you can never switch off/your always call. increasing/changing regulations, the responsibility to your livestock family/ancestors combined with the easy access to the tools to end it all. But I'm sure you know all this and I'm teaching granny to suck eggs so to speak! Take care and thank you."



Upper Wharfedale Venturer – the future

n 4 June 2015 a packed meeting in Kettlewell Village Hall listened to the Director of Passenger Transport for North Yorkshire County Council explain that, from April 2016, the Skiptonto-Buckden Pride of the Dales bus service would terminate at Grassington. This was because of cuts to the local transport subsidy. The key message was that, if the people of Upper Wharfedale wanted a bus service, we would have to set up our own.

It seemed an unlikely proposition, but we quickly realised that it was true, and also that it might just be possible, particularly as it became clear that NYCC would be prepared to support us financially. Over the following weeks, a small group of local people worked together to understand what would be involved and to develop an outline proposal and business plan. By September, we had submitted a bid to NYCC; in December we heard it had been successful. Three frantic months followed in which many people from Buckden, Kettlewell, and beyond got involved in all sorts of ways to help make the Upper Wharfedale Venturer a reality.

On Monday 11th April 2016, the Venturer set off from Buckden for the first time (complete with BBC camera crew), and the service was up and running. Since then, we have carried 70,000 passengers and covered 200,000 miles up and down the dale. By the end of 2022 passenger numbers had almost recovered to pre-Covid levels, and in 2023, helped by the £2 fare-cap scheme, we have carried more passengers than at this stage in any previous year.

In July this year, we finally managed to get our new bus into service; quieter, more comfortable, more economical, and greener, with low-floor access to help those with restricted mobility.



Meanwhile, we are fortunate to have a fantastic team of some 20 people who are involved in running the service in various ways, both employees and volunteers, driving of course, but also involved in planning the service, keeping the bus on the road, and running the business side.

So, with a great team, good passenger numbers, a brand-new bus, and a fare cap scheme in place until November 2024, the future of the service looks bright? Well – for the next couple of years....yes. However, in the long term, the challenge is that many of those involved in setting up and running the service from the start are in or are approaching their seventies. If Upper Wharfedale Bus is to have a long-term future, we need more people locally who would be up for driving or helping out in other ways. Essentially, we need new people to get involved, as those who have been there from the start step back over the coming years. Otherwise, it is hard to see how the service will survive through to the end of the decade. All of the above provides many resounding reasons why we should place as much importance on the protection of our dark skies as we do our daytime flora and fauna, in order for our native creatures of the night to flourish under a star studded sky.
