

From the Vicar

According to legend, if it rains on St Swithun's day, 15 July, it will really rain - for the next 40 days: "St Swithun's day if thou dost rain / for forty days it will remain". A Buckinghamshire variation goes like this: "If on St Swithun's day it really pours / you're better off to stay indoors".

The legend began when Swithun's mortal remains were transferred inside the newly restored Cathedral at Winchester on 15 July 971. He had initially been buried outside the Cathedral at his own request, "where it might be subject



to the feet of passers-by and to the raindrops pouring from on high". A heavy shower on the day of the move was thought to be the saint marking his displeasure, being moved against his wishes.

There is a scientific basis to the weather pattern behind the legend. Around the middle of July, the jet stream settles into a pattern which holds steady until the end of August. When it lies north of the British Isles continental high pressure is able to move in; when it lies south of the British Isles, Atlantic weather systems predominate. The most false that the prediction has been was in 1913 when a 15-hour rainstorm on 15 July was followed by 30 dry days out of 40.

We are increasingly conscious of the ways in which climate change is already impacting the rainfall and the occurrence of drought. When water is becoming increasingly scarce in the next three months it is a good time to give thanks for rain and to acknowledge it as a blessing. We are reminded to act too - to conserve water where possible and to support the work of charities which support those trying to survive in the parts of our world where there is severe drought.



♦ Waters of Baptism



Tom preached the following sermon on Sunday 26 June on 'A New Identity in Baptism'

fortnight ago Lucy was baptised just outside here in the river Skirfare. It was a private baptism in the afternoon during the really hot weather. Lucy and her husband-to-be Guy have just sent me the photos and what is clear in all of them is that Lucy looks overjoyed and happy to be baptised.

It was one of my most memorable baptisms. I was sorry that you as the regular congregation here weren't there to see it - as baptisms, particularly the baptism of adults, is a great encouragement to us all as a Church. I have been part of six adult baptisms in my 24 years of ministry as a priest and wish there were the opportunities for more, given our tendency to put most of our focus on infant baptism in the Church of England.

Of those six adult baptisms there was one full immersion baptism during my time as Vicar at St Chad's Far Headingley - of Juliet who was getting married to Peter. Juliet, like Lucy, wanted to be baptised before she was married. And Juliet was particularly keen on having a full immersion baptism. So, I borrowed an immersion tank from a local house church and slowly filled it up. It took a while trying

to get it to a comfortable swimming pool temperature, but it was worth it: the congregation at St Chad's also found it profoundly moving occasion, being able to participate in part of someone's faith journey, and to share in Juliet's joy.

The symbolism that you get from a full immersion is incredibly strong which is sadly lost when we simply sprinkle water over someone's head. A full immersion involves this almost literal drowning as someone goes fully under the water.

Our reading from Romans 6 1-11 today uses strongly baptismal language. Paul says, "You must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Jesus Christ." Lucy when she was anointed looked radiant. At each baptism we get a sense of joy filling the face of a person who radiates new life. So too for each of us as baptised believers, it reminds us of our own baptism, whether we remember it or not.

In our reading Paul is astonished that people use their Christian freedom so badly. Romans chapter 6 begins with these strong words, "Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? Absolutely not". Paul is incredulous when he realises that some people have heard his message of God's

free grace as a signal that they can do what they like and get away with it. True, God's forgiveness does not have to be earned, and it never can be. But accepting it means stepping out of one life and into another. It is about a new sense of identity in following the footsteps of Christ.

In the back of Paul's mind in Romans chapter 6 to 8 is the story of the Exodus: God's people have left Egypt by coming through the waters of the Red Sea; they have left the old territory behind, the old territory of sin and death as it were, by being baptised into Christ.

Our Gospel reading (Matthew 10.24-39) has the same challenge from Jesus to his followers - to be able to live out of this new identity. He doesn't say it will be easy. But they will know God's protection, and that they are "of more value than many sparrows".

Think of the political situation and recent developments in Russia. When people are led badly, they aren't free to make the good choices, it is a "shackled freedom" to only be able to choose war, to only be able to choose manipulation. We here in this country have our political freedoms and we are freely able to choose the good and to make wise choices informed by our faith.

I'm not really in this business as a priest to promote the cause of Churchianity. But I



rather hope that you might each know and be increasingly aware of "the joy of Christ within you, the hope of glory", and to be able to act on that basis.

We are each free agents in God's grace. So this week let's use that precious freedom we have in Christ to make good decisions reflecting Christ's love for us who has freed us from the old order of sin and death to live life in all its fullness.

Let us be alive to Christ in the way we live conscious of what our baptism means for us as we live for today, free to take up responsibility. Because real freedom isn't so much about 'independence' - it is about being willingly co-dependent: dependent upon God and dependent on one another in a life of loving service.

😘 Remembering Ann Rushby 1931 - 2023

Ernest and Ann Turner ran the Falcon Inn in the 1960's and 70's until his untimely death in 1980. Ann later remarried and moved to Bentham, where she passed away aged 92. Her sons, Ian and Jonty, shared memories of their mum at her funeral at Arncliffe church.

As you run into the Falcon to slake your thirst after the service, and the first one's on Mum, look up at the bedroom window above the door. This bedroom is called number three and it was there where Mum. Ann Ellen Miller, was born on 16th February

1931. Her parents & our grandparents were Thomas (Tom) & Dorothy (Dolly) Miller.

Mum stayed at the Falcon for a few vears and then moved to Hawkswick. She remembered having to walk to Arncliffe school in the rain and the in the dark when she was particularly scared of walking past Hawkswick wood.

Mum & Dad met in Long Preston, and Jonty & I arrived a few years later. In 1961 we moved to Arncliffe where they ran the Falcon. Mum had no previous experience of cooking for many people, but she soon got the hang of it and became a very good cook.

She found a huge steel tray in the cellar and one of her party pieces was to use it as a sledge down the

Falcon stairs. I think there are a few people in church today who have done that too! One summer Dad grew a moustache which Mum hated and so she cut some of her hair off and stuck it to her top lip. People would ask for sandwiches through the kitchen door and Mum would take their orders wearing the moustache. Some people didn't bat an eyelid whilst others burst out laughing. Dad's moustache didn't last much longer!

At the Falcon she also became a very keen and successful gardener and over the years she transformed the garden into quite a show. In future years she did the same to other gardens where she moved to, such as the Old Vicarage in Arncliffe, another at Laurieston in Scotland, and finally at her bungalow in Bentham.

It was at the Falcon that she was nicknamed Annski by one of the regular visitors. When her first grandchild arrived, this was changed to Granski and she was known by that name by all her grandchildren. As Jonty and I grew taller we nicknamed her 'Small' because she was, and one of our favourite tricks was to hold her round the waist, lift her up and turn her upside down. I don't think it was her favourite though!

While we stayed at the Falcon, I had

bought my first car, a Morris 1100! One New Year's Eve, very late, Mum thought it would be a great idea to go up the Pen Y Ghent road to see the new moon and return to Litton by a rough track, totally unsuitable for my car! Of course, we got stuck on a big rock, couldn't move the car and had to walk all the way home at 3am! The following day we had to go round to Malcolm and ask if we could borrow the

tractor to drag the car home. Mum said she was sorry, but she did have a good laugh about it!

Ian has captured Mum very well there! The photograph on the service sheet of Mum and Geoff Lund really says it all for me. I was fortunate to visit her in Lancaster hospital, not long ago. We talked about Arncliffe and childhood memories, and I said something that made her laugh. I was rebuked with the words, "Give up yer daft sod!", but her smile was just the same at 92 as it is on the tricycle, that to me, was her, her sense of fun, her love of life, even when times were not easy. I'd like you all to remember the fun and laughter she brought into all of our lives.

The waters of the Wharfe and Skirfare are teeming with ducks at the moment – mostly young families of mallard that follow their mothers up and down the shallow stretches of river, but also occasional broods of Goosander, and there have even been a pair of Mandarin ducks in residence around Arncliffe recently.

The population of ducks on our rivers will soon massively surge and just as rapidly decline, as it does every year. For it is Duck Season! But no ducks lose their lives for this is Duck Racing, not hunting! In July, Arncliffe Duck Race will be held on Saturday 15 July, with Buckden Duck Race taking place the following weekend on 23 July. Hundreds of yellow plastic bathtub ducks will be tipped into the river, to be chased downstream by large numbers of excited children (and adults). Depending on the weather, the chase may be at snail's pace, as last year, when the dawdling and becalmed ducks needed quite a bit of help to reach the finishing line!



For the rest of the year, the main river sport is fishing, usually with rod and line. Perhaps the most unusual fishing expedition on the Skirfare and Wharfe took place 175 years ago, when Captain Francis Salvin visited the area at the invitation of several fishing clubs, including Kilnsey. Captain Salvin was a keen falconer and had also come for young Peregrine falcons, which

nested on Arnberg Scar in those days. But it was his other hunting skill that caused much entertainment. for he fished with cormorants! His visit to Arncliffe may have been arranged by the vicar of Arncliffe, William Boyd, who also originated from the north-east of England and had invited Captain Salvin's relative, Anthony Salvin, the architect, to design the restoration of Arncliffe church in 1841. Boyd relates his memories of this remarkable visit in his book, 'Littondale Past and Present'.

"Some years ago, Mr Salvin, the wellknown falconer, came here to procure a brood of this once famous falcon; and it was the same visit in which he so amused the dalesmen by catching an abundance of trout with his cleverly trained cormorants."

Captain Salvin provides a few more details in his book 'Falconry'.

"At the Kilnsey club, which I visited in the summer of 1848, I had two days fishing. On the best day I 'threw off' in the Arncliffe brook and fished it and the River Wharfe to the first falls. As I was anxious to know what amount of fish could be taken where they were plentiful, I fished for seven hours before the birds were completely done, when the results were 45 fine trout weighing 20 pounds."

Can't imagine he would be allowed to do so nowadays!

s I'm writing this, the long June heatwave has broken and soft summer rain is falling outside. You can almost see the grass greening and growing; flower buds that have been tightly closed are unfurling and opening their petals to the welcome downpour and swallows dip and dive over the fields filling their beaks with the abundant midges that respond to the warm, moist conditions. A stormy, hot and showery July beckons.

In recent days, I have had a close encounter with a moth, a wren, and a (different) wren eating a (different) moth! There is a lot to be said about the meditative act of noticing everyday beauty and activity in nature, and there is an abundance of treats to notice in the summer months.



One day last week I was joined in the bathroom while cleaning my teeth, by a Small Elephant Hawkmoth. In no way elephantine, and not particularly hawk-like; the battenburg-coloured creature, Deilephila Porcellus, is a nocturnal moth feeding on tubular flowers such as honeysuckle. The caterpillars particularly like to munch on Rosebay Willowherb, Purple Loosestrife and Ladies Bedstraw. Though fairly common, they're a real showstopper of a moth, all blushing pinks

and deep gold, and I was delighted to see one close up.

My first wren encounter was the result of an unfortunate cat raid on a nest. I found the tiny fledgling sitting minding its own business in my hallway. Thankfully it was uninjured, and I was able to return it to its mother. Though not the smallest of UK birds (this honour goes to the Goldcrest), wrens are tiny, very shouty birds with a distinct upright tail. The fledgling was so small, when clasped in my hands, it made me look like a giant. Fi Fi Fo Fum!



A few days later I was out feeding the poultry and I saw a wren dancing from foot to foot on the wall trying to catch a moth that wasn't much smaller in size. After a few moments of delicate feathery jousting, the wren captured its quarry and flew off, I imagine, to feed a growing family. A fleeting private moment I was privileged to see.

Take time to pause in your day to just notice, and I'm sure you will be richly rewarded.
