Posada Adventure in Advent

I am delighted to say that a recent request for help in knitting some woolly nativity figures has resulted in a stunning Mary and Joseph and baby Jesus complete with donkey who are now ready for doing the rounds of the parish this Advent.



The hope is that the

children and young families of this parish might wish to host the figures in their homes in the run up to Christmas. We will send them on their way out into the world on Advent Sunday and then welcome them back into the different Churches of the parish on Christmas Eve.

The posada tradition comes from Latin America. The word posada means "an inn", or "place of shelter". The concept is that folk are invited to offer hospitality to the figures as a way of spiritually being open to God present in our midst, the message at the heart of the Christmas story.

Hosting the nativity figures is a tradition that I have tried in former parishes, and also when I was a hospice chaplain, where all of the different departments were happy to be hosts. In one parish the idea really took off and we had three separate nativity figures doing the rounds.

I hope all those involved will enjoy giving shelter to the holy family as a spiritual exercise in the run up to Christmas. It was a team effort bringing the idea to life and our grateful thanks to Sandra, Sandie, Josie, Charmaine, Barbara, Maggie, Jayne, Sue, Deirdre and Christine for creating this joyful and precious new resource.

Upper Wharfedale Refugee Collection For many years now, Upper Wharfedale Refugee Support group has organised a collection of toiletries, stationery, and underwear for refugees at Christmas. Over the past few years, we have been joined by the local churches, the schools and Buckden Singers and it has become a major community effort. The collection will go to Bradford where the 'fancy' items will be used as Christmas presents with Upper Wharfedale's good wishes and the rest will be distributed as needed: now, and over the coming weeks. This has been a very difficult few years for asylum seekers and refugees and it now takes years to receive a decision. For those living in 'hotels' while awaiting a decision it is pretty grim. They receive an allowance of £9pw to cover phones, transport, clothing, toiletries and any additional food. The Bradford charities (we link with BIASAN) try to supplement this with donations of cash and items such as toiletries and phone cards. Times are hard for UK families too and there are fewer donations. Our collection enables the meagre allowance to go further, and toiletries smell nice! New underwear is always needed, and the stationery is valued in the English classes.

Traditional Dales village music and dancing – Amerdale Hall, Arncliffe – Nearly 60 people came from far and wide



on Sunday 22 October 2023 to make it a happy and vibrant hall that afternoon. The Buttered Peas band played, and the caller Terry Evans took the circles, squares or lines of dancers through the moves of traditional dances from the Dales and elsewhere. Then everyone had a go, people of all ages, some with experience of this kind of dancing but most with none. The hall seemed to buzz with the energy, noise, smiles and sometimes hilarious laughter of people on the move, mostly under control but sometimes verging on the chaotic. It looked and felt like FUN! It was good to see a good number of children joining in – entry was free for them - and above all it was great to welcome some refugees. The band's flute and guitar were able to play two Ukrainian tunes for a Ukrainian family now living in Skipton, and the Anchor Project in Bradford brought a minibus with 15 people, mostly refugees. Caller Terry quickly adapted her programme so that several small African children could join in. Joyously, they did!

Many thanks to Sarah Paul and the Amerdale Hall team for the excellent tea and cake refreshments and for all their help to Buttered Peas in putting on such a happy afternoon in the hall. 'Buttered Peas', by the way, is named after the well-known Dales dance which was done that afternoon to tunes from Dentdale and Langstrothdale. 

🛇 'ALL OUR CHILDREN'.....36 years later

"In the early hours of 19 May 1987, Jenny Turner was born in Airedale General Hospital, near Keighley, only 7 minutes after her mother, Fiona, had walked into the labour room." (Yorkshire Post, 9 Aril 1990).

L's over 33 years since the first episode of 'All Our Children' was broadcast on BBC1 on Easter Day 1990, telling the story of six children born the same day across five continents, representing the 350,000 born that day around the world. Jenny was one of those babies, and they and their families were regularly filmed in their homes over the next two years. Fiona and Jenny recall their memories of life in Arncliffe at that time, and the impact of the filming on their lives.

What was the purpose of the documentary series 'All our Children' and how did you get involved?

Fiona: The purpose of the programme was to compare childhood in different countries and see what similarities all children experience. We were the British family, other families were in Africa, South America, Hungary, China and India. The producer, David Brown, wanted a northern, rural family with at least two older children. He contacted hospitals to find out which babies would be born in May, then interviewed several families. I think he chose us because Jonty was a farm man so lots of filming opportunity. Also, he knew Littondale and liked the idea of filming there.

What are your memories of it over 30 years later - does anything stand out?

Fiona: Because they filmed monthly for the first year then every two months for the next two years, we got to know the crew well so could be natural with them, and I am still in touch with David Brown. At first it was strange, we felt very much on our best behaviour, but soon relaxed into it. Occasionally filming could be obtrusive, they filmed the children waking up, so we had to put them to sleep in one room and the crew came at 5.00am. Normally it just became another day. We were given all the rushes to view and did have some say on what was used, but I don't remember

rejecting anything. I have some lovely videos of my children playing in circumstances that a parent wouldn't normally film, professional home video. Some filming was done at Arncliffe school and other children from the dale were involved. It's a lovely record of times gone by. Occasionally we watch some of it with

the grandchildren, nice for them to see their parents as children.

How did it change your lives - if at all?

Fiona: I don't think it changed our lives at all, it wasn't that sort of reality programme. I think the older children quite liked being filmed, the younger ones didn't really notice too much. Jonty or I were told what they wanted to film, but most of the time the children just played or did an activity with a camera crew hovering in the background. Some things were orchestrated but the aim was to observe normal play and family life.

What did Jenny and her brothers and sisters think of it at the time - and now?

Fiona: The children have fond memories and now find it amusing watching themselves. We watched the finished series

together as a family, so it was interesting to see how different cultures view childhood and family life and sad too that many children were not as fortunate as ours, but there are so many similarities in the way that all children play wherever in the world they are.


Jenny: I don't have any memory of the film crews been part of our lives for those first 3 years, as I was too young. However, I do love watching the footage and how the film crews and producers managed to catch some incredible moments of our lives. I'm very grateful to have it all on film.

Our childhood was full of fun and sibling squabbles, its humbling to see how we looked out for each other, and our friendship with other families. We were so privileged to live and grow up in such a beautiful place in the dales with access to the best nature brings, playing in the rivers, climbing trees, making dens and been in the outdoors.

Now a mother of 5 myself I love nothing more than returning to the Dale to see my children enjoy it too.

I have also shown my children the filming of us, and the 'All Our Children' book, and they find it very amusing seeing their Grandparents, the house, clothes and watching their Uncles and Aunty playing, fighting and making friends.

Looking through the book, you realise how different the childhood years are for families in different countries and how their routine differs from our own. We were so lucky to have what we had.

n Monday 13 November Revd Annie Naish was licensed by the Area Bishop of Ripon, Bishop Anna Eltringham, as a Chaplain at Scargill. Annie shares in ministry with the co-leaders of the community, Phil and Di Stone and a team of two other Chaplains, Revd Mike Leigh (who come to Scargill with his family as the country emerged from lockdown) and Revd Phil Goodacre (who joined more recently in May 2022), thus making a trinity.

Annie's licensing took place at the height of Storm Debbie. Every few moments the chapel at Scargill would start creaking loudly in the wind. Community leader Phil pointed out that it was a very good thing that the chapel was creaking: it was designed to move and bend with the wind. When you shut your eyes it was easy to imagine that you were in a wooden boat at sea with the creaking from the strong gusts of wind and the spray of water hitting the windows.

This sea-going atmosphere provided continuity for Annie who was coming to Scargill after recent ministry working with the medical mission agency Mercy Ships. In her sermon Bishop Anna also transported us to the sea by immersing us in the bible reading Annie had chosen, the resurrection story at the end of John's Gospel where Jesus prepares a barbecue for the disciples on the beach beside the Sea of Galilee.

Bishop Anna compared this heightened reality experience to the last day of a summer holiday. She invited us to imagine being with family and friends 'huddled together' around an open fire at the seaside and watching the sun set. We were invited to recall the memorable smells and tastes associated with such an experience: the warmth of the fire, the crisp fresh sea air and the delicious taste of freshly cooked chargrilled fish, a unifying experience of shared discipleship.

Having a triune team of Chaplains is demonstrative of a real investment in people as part of the resurrected Scargill community and the wonderful pastoral care that the community is able to offer those who visit. The words of the licensing service for Annie powerfully made the point that this pastoral leadership is a way of sharing in Jesus's own ministry. 🛇 Julia Norman Queen 1939-2023

Residents of Kettlewell, friends and family will mourn the passing of Julia Queen, nee Davis.

Julia was born in Edgware, Middlesex on 14th April 1939, she attended schools in North London and later, Cripplegate Secretarial College in the City.

In 1958 she took a job as a secretary at the London School of Economics and then joined solicitors Matthew & Matthew in

Lincoln's Inn Fields. Seeking a more challenging occupation she went to Paris and took a job as an au pair to the wealthy Barthelemy family and enrolled at the Sorbonne

University. Julia returned in 1961 to join BEA as a Flight Clerk and progressed to a stewardess with

BOAC, flying routes to the Far East and Africa, sometimes on the infamous Comet aeroplanes.

Her first marriage produced daughter Lisa and son Lance and she returned to a desk job with Air Canada, managing perfectly well without computers! In 1976 she joined the family electrical retailer H. Norman Davis in Mill Hill one of the first companies in the country to sell or hire TV sets.

In 1987 she married Yorkshireman Geoffrey Queen, a senior Civil Engineer with British Rail and, on his retirement, moved to Kettlewell, in Wharfedale, originally on a two-year trial! Despite the new surroundings, she entered fully into village life pursuing her passion for gardening with plots at both Church and Village Hall, secretary to the Horticultural Society, teaching assistant at Kettlewell School and a very active member of the early Scarecrow Festival serving as treasurer, merchandise procurer, stall worker and Trail Sheet artist. Never wanting to be centre stage, she was a competent and creative stage manager for many village shows.



Julia had an interest in art throughout her life having attended numerous art classes and she active was an member of Buckden Art Group, exhibiting many of her own water colours and possessing a talent she never really accepted herself.

Surprisingly, for a Londoner, she soon developed an interest in Rugby League!

In 2020 she was diagnosed with Myeloma and, though controlled with chemotherapy, she later developed a colon cancer requiring major surgery and, recently, an incurable lung cancer finally ended her life after a three-year battle, bravely borne.

A private family cremation took place in November and a Service of Thanksgiving will be held in the New Year.

Her determination, cheerful smile and lovely character will be missed by her family, friends and Kettlewell residents.

The days frustrate, as it feels like all outdoor activities have to be squeezed into the rapidly diminishing daylight hours and, as always, there is the strong pull to a fireside spot as energy and



motivation seem to desert us.

The good news is that the winter solstice; the shortest day, is rapidly approaching, happening a few days before Christmas, on Friday 23^{rd} . After this point, the days incrementally start to get longer as we commence the slow movement back towards the light.

The word 'solstice' hails from the Latin 'solstitium' meaning 'sun stands still'. At the winter solstice, the sun reaches its most southerly point against the background stars.
